It offers opportunities for sharing and for growth that no other relationship can equal, a physical and emotional joining that is promised for a lifetime.

Marriage is much more than your signatures on a legal contract. You are promising, in front of all these people you love, that you want to be with each other for the rest of your lives.

1st Reading

We are now going to listen to an extract from 'The Velveteen Rabbit' by Margery Williams, narrated by Samuel West

"What is REAL?" asked the Rabbit one day, when they were lying side by side near the nursery fender, before Nanna came to tidy the room. "Does it mean having things that buzz inside you and a stick-out handle?"

"Real isn't how you are made," said the Skin Horse. "It's a thing that happens to you. When a child loves you for a long, long time, not just to play with, but REALLY loves you, then you become Real."

Anne had just flown in from the UK and vividly recalls the moment she noticed Andrew at the hospital. He looked up from his computer and there was an immediate attraction and sense that she had always known him, however, at the same time she also thought "well that feels a little bit weird because he's not very tall **and** he has white hair".

Andrew also remembers the 'moment' they first met, he shook Anne's hand and immediately thought you're rather sexy and obviously very intelligent. Then Anne's stepmother Annette said, 'she's just arrived from England and hasn't had a shower yet!' Andrew smiled to himself and said, "Lucky for me I have very little sense of smell."
